<b>Maheshwari</b>	Madhya Pradesh	Silk and cotton blend with distinctive zari borders

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<b>Gharchola</b>	Gujarat	Traditional sarees with square and floral motifs
<b>Chikankari</b>	Uttar Pradesh	Hand-embroidered cotton fabric with white thread
<b>Sanganeri Print</b>	Rajasthan	Block-printed fabric with floral and geometric patterns
<b>Kutch Embroidery</b>	Gujarat	Colorful embroidery with mirror work
<b>Narayanpet</b>	Telangana	Cotton and silk sarees with zari borders
<b>Mysore Silk</b>	Karnataka	Silk sarees known for their simplicity and elegance
<b>Ilkal</b>	Karnataka	Cotton sarees with checks and temple borders
<b>Kantha</b>	West Bengal	Running stitch embroidery on sarees and fabric

<b>Kosa Silk</b>	Chhattisgarh	Silk from the silk-producing regions of Chhattisgarh
<b>Phulkari</b>	Punjab	Embroidery with vibrant threadwork on fabric

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<b>Tanchoi</b>	Gujarat	Silk fabric with woven floral or geometric patterns
<b>Sujani</b>	Bihar	Hand-stitched quilts with intricate patterns
<b>Kantha Stitch</b>	West Bengal	Running stitch embroidery on fabric or sarees
<b>Zari</b>	Varanasi	Metallic thread used for weaving and embroidery
<b>Himroo</b>	Maharashtra	Silk and cotton blend with zari patterns
<b>Kullu Shawl</b>	Himachal Pradesh	Woolen shawls with colorful patterns
<b>Mekhela Chador</b>	Assam	Traditional Assamese attire with silk or cotton fabric
<b>Tussar Silk</b>	Bihar, Jharkhand	Coarse silk known for its natural gold color
<b>Mashru</b>	Gujarat	Silk and cotton blend with a satin-like finish
<b>Gamcha</b>	West Bengal, Odisha	Traditional handwoven cotton towels
<b>Kosa Saree</b>	Chhattisgarh	Sarees made from Kosa silk fibers
<b>Patan Patola</b>	Gujarat	Double ikat silk sarees with geometric patterns
