

The 2026 ceremony was dominated by two very different films. **Paul Thomas Anderson's** revolutionary saga *One Battle After Another* and **Chloé Zhao's** poignant Shakespearean drama *Hamnet* led the pack, proving that both high-energy blockbusters and intimate literary adaptations have a home in Hollywood's "biggest party."

One Battle After Another swept four major categories, including Best Director and Best Screenplay for Anderson. Meanwhile, *Hamnet* pulled off a stunning upset for Best Motion Picture – Drama, with **Jessie Buckley** taking home the trophy for Best Actress.

Historic Wins and Records

The 2026 ceremony wasn't just about the trophies; it was about breaking barriers. **Wagner Moura** made history as the first Brazilian actor to win Best Actor in a Drama for his haunting role in *The Secret Agent*.

Over in the Musical/Comedy category, **Timothée Chalamet** became the youngest actor ever to win Best Actor for *Marty Supreme*, surpassing legends like Leonardo DiCaprio. His speech, which included a sweet nod to partner Kylie Jenner, was arguably the most-watched clip of the night.
